

Reading Activity Ideas – Individual / Families

Launching reading-related activities alongside the **Read to Give** program can motivate your children and enrich their reading experience. You may modify or adapt the reading activity ideas below to suit your needs.

Setting Reading / Fundraising Target ★

Setting a goal and keeping track of progress can motivate your children. To make it more fun, you can replace numbers with pictures of animals, food, or anything your child likes.

Letter to your favorite book character ★

Ask your children to write a letter to their favorite book characters.



Guess the Book ★

Pick a book and let others guess the book title by giving hints and acting it out.

Read Aloud ★

Spend regular time reading to your children

Advanced version:

- Ask questions from time to time to see what everyone thinks might happen next.
- Break the story into sections and end each session with a cliff-hanger to keep your children eager for the next reading.
- While following your children's interests, also introduce new types of books to broaden their horizons and spark new interests.
- Read aloud outdoors to create a fun and positive reading experience!



Six Ws ★

After reading a story, ask your children questions about the six Ws (Who, When, Where, What, Why, and How) to see how well they understand the story.

Make a New Story ★

Ask your children to write down the six Ws on separate pieces of paper for several different stories. Then, collect them all and have them pick a new set of six Ws to create a brand-new story.

Advanced version:

Invite your children to role-play the stories they have just created.

Design a New Book Cover ★★

Pick a random book to read, then design a new book cover using techniques such as torn paper art, paper collage, finger painting, or sponge painting.
